- 1 A theatrical convention in which an actor speaks directly to the audience to explain who the characters are and what is happening
- 2 A hand-held object that an actor uses on stage
- 3 What the characters in a script are thinking or feeling; it is not always the same as what they are saying!
- 4 A theatrical convention in which the audience understands that onstage time isn't necessarily the time that the action would take in real life
